Chaka Abramovna's grandparents were killed at Babi Yar. Her father "vanished without a trace." As a result of the War's deprivations, her mother became ill and Chaka had to raise her two younger brothers. She never married or had children. Now all of us who care have become her "family".



During our visits overseas we see a remarkable change in each survivor as they realize they have not been forgotten by the world, that there are kind people far away who care. Having someone interested in their experiences, someone to share their family history, someone to look through their precious photographs, means the world to them.
